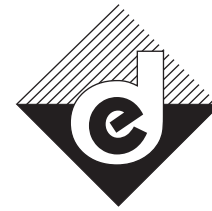

**Discharge instructions
following Gastroscopy**

When you get home please read these instructions carefully.

You should expect to be back to normal activities and diet the day following your procedure.

Unless otherwise you have been instructed take your usual medications and follow up with your GP as scheduled.

Drink plenty of non-caffeinated fluids for the next 24 hours.

Due to the ongoing effects of your anaesthetic for the remainder of the day:

- Do not drink alcoholic beverages.

- Do not sign any legal documents or make important decisions.

- Do not drive a car or operate heavy machinery, your insurance will not cover you.

- Rest for today and resume normal activities tomorrow.

You can remove the dressing from your IV site when you get home. You may notice some local tenderness or bruising; this is normal and will subside.

You may commence eating and drinking now. Eat a light diet today that is not too spicy or fatty. You should be back to eating your normal diet tomorrow. Increase your fluids to avoid feeling light headed or dizzy however limit caffeinated drinks such as tea, coffee and cola.

Take your time when standing from a seated position to avoid falling.

In the initial recovery period we recommend you change your position frequently to avoid an injury due to pressure

A copy of your report and any specimens will be sent to your referring GP.

Please make an **appointment with your GP after 5 working days** for all results of your procedure.

A repeat Gastrosocopy has been recommended for _____.

Please contact your GP closer to this date to obtain a new referral.

Please contact us if you change your phone or address details, so we can update our records.

Minor symptoms following a gastroscopy are common.

You may experience the following:

Abdominal discomfort and bloating: This should be relieved by bringing up wind. If your discomfort is **severe or increasing** you should contact your GP or present to an Emergency Department for assessment.

Discomfort in back of your throat: This may persist for the rest of today but should gradually lessen. Contact your GP if it persists more than 24 hours.

Red or swollen IV site: Place a cool, damp, clean cloth on the site for 20 minutes every hour until the redness or swelling decreases. If swelling or redness persists longer than 24 hours you should visit the GP for assessment.

Nausea with or without vomiting: If you are feeling nauseated, start with clear liquids such as ginger ale, lemonade, jelly, broth or apple juice. When you no longer feel nauseated, you should commence a solid diet. If nausea **with vomiting** persists longer than 3 hours, visit your GP.

Contact us: If you have fever or require antibiotics in the first 30 days post procedure, or if you visit your GP or emergency department for any complications related to your procedure, telephone 9781 5959, ask for Director of Clinical Services.
